- What are your views on interpersonal vs. technical skills. Which are more important in today's workplace?

In Accountancy, I think interpersonal skills are just as important as technical skills. As accounting professionals begin to reach the top of a finance function, the ability to build effective relationships and demonstrate leadership capabilities become crucial for progression. I believe you can teach technical skills, but you can't teach someone how to have a good personality.

- What are your views on the thought that young people lack employability skills?

 They are also lacking basic 'soft' skills, such as communication and team work which are vital to succeed in the working world. Accounting firms need young people that are resilient, good and effective communicators, showing an understanding of how to work as part of a driven team that delivers all the time.
- What advice can you give to school leavers looking to develop their employability skills? It is important that school leavers focus on gaining employability and soft skills which can be transferred between different jobs and employment sectors. I believe these are the fundamental foundation of their career building blocks.
